


Catch the Reading Bug

Lunar New Year

Lunar New Year is mainly celebrated in Asian cultures. The celebrations begin from the first new moon in the lunar calendar and end on the first full moon, 15 days later.

During the Lunar New Year, it is a tradition to give a bright red envelope (hóngbāo) to family and friends. The red colour symbolises good luck and wealth in Asian cultures. People sometimes put money in the red envelope which has been a tradition for centuries.



A common food that people will eat are dumplings, fish and spring rolls. On Lunar New Year, people also wear new clothes and clean the house,

which symbolises the start of a fresh, new year.



It is a tradition in Chinese cultures to also hang lanterns and other decorations around the house. There is a poster that has a word meaning luck, and it is flipped upside down. This is because it is to keep the bad luck out. People also pop firecrackers which scare the evil 'bad luck' monster.



Red symbolizes fire, good fortune and joy. Whereas gold represents wealth, illumination and prosperity. Red and Gold is the colour combination used in Lunar New Year.

China has 12 Zodiac animals which include (in order): the Rat, Ox, Tiger, Rabbit, Dragon, Snake, Horse, Monkey, Rooster, Dog and Pig. This order was decided in a mythical legend that says long ago, in China, a Jade Emperor decided there should be a way of measuring time. On one of the king's birthdays, he told the animals to prepare for a race across a river. He said that the first twelve animals across the river would have a year with their name.

This year, it is the Year of the Ox



In Week 2 the Year 6s started Summer Interschool Sports. There were sports such as Cricket, Tennis, Rounders, Volleyball, Softball and Endzone.

Every week the Year 6 students have practice sessions on Wednesday at lunch playtime, then on Friday they play a match against our local schools such as Mount Waverley, Mount View, Essex Heights and Mount Scopus.
