ROBO-CUP STATE ROBOTICS COMPETITION 2023

On Saturday September 2, our Glendal Robo-Cup team participated in the State Robotics competition at Genazzano FCJ College, Kew.

Our Primary teams were Yeva and Baveshka (team Georgia), and Aden (team Aden).

Our Riley Rover teams were Ricky and Aryav (team Cyborg 2); Jeffrey and Eric (team Messi 8); Grace and Aaron (team TACO), Tim and Jaapas (team TNJ), Sarong and Aaron (team Striker), Tareen and Johnathon (team Goofy Gas), Aryan and Rishi (team Mbappe), Andrew and Ararva (team Starbot), Leo and Ashton (team Orbit), and Jenson, Jai Yi and Andy (team Hello).

The Competition Challenge

There were 2 Divisions, Riley Rover and Primary with 5 rounds and cumulative scoring.

Riley Rover Division: Robots competed by following a winding black line on a series of tiles to a designated rescue area. The robot encountered a bridge, sharp-angled turns, and an obstacle on the line. The robot drove into a chemical spill and sought 'the victim' before pushing it out to safety. The competition time was 2 minutes. Each tile achieved held a score.

Primary Division: Robots competed by following a winding black line on a series of tiles to a designated rescue area. On the way, the robot encountered challenging obstacles, bridges, and shortcut opportunities. The robot arrived at a green coloured area which indicated a chemical spill. While the clock is still ticking the robot had to find "the victim" before pushing it out of the chemical spill to safety and then the robot had to leave this area following the black line. The competition time was 2 minutes. Each tile achieved held a score.

Some teams were interviewed to explain their coding and robot design and those who went on to compete in the finals played 3 rounds in a knock-out final.

Of our Primary teams, Yeva, Baveshka and Aden achieved a place in the finals.

Of our Riley Rover teams, Jenson, Jai Yi and Andy achieved a place in the finals.

Congratulations to our winning teams.

Primary winning teams: first place Yeva and Baveshka and second place Aden.

Congratulations to Aden who also won the Technical Award – an award acknowledging creative, high-skill coding.

Our teams have worked very hard. They encouraged and supported each other, showed good sportsmanship in competition, and displayed resilience and the ability to problem-solve went things went wrong. Congratulations to everyone who competed in the Robotics competition. An amazing achievement everyone!

YEAR 5 EXCURSION TO OLD TREASURY BUILDING AND IMMIGRATION MUSEUM

On Wednesday, August 23rd, the Year 5 students travelled by bus to the Immigration Museum and Old Treasury Building in the city with a number of parent helpers. We met up early in the morning on the hardcourt at 8:45am and arrived in the city just over an hour later. Everyone was excited for the day's adventure!





At the Immigration Museum, we first learnt about Australia's history of its First People and then the timeline for when immigrants began moving to Australia. It was surprising to learn that over millions of years that Australia has had Indigenous people, it was only the last 200 years or so that immigrants started arriving. We first started with an activity in our table groups and researched an immigrant from different time periods, the 1950s, 1970s, 1990s and 2000s. Did you know that the person who came up with Myers the store was a Russian immigrant who fled the conflicts in that country? After this, our guide, Pat, gave each of us a newly updated "passport" to jot down anything we noticed as we went through the exhibit halls of the museum. We were very lucky to be the first school ever to be given these passport booklets. There was so much to see at the museum including an interesting video about the life of people from the past that had to experience many hardships like natural disasters such as flooding and war.



At the Old Treasury Building, we were split into four groups, each led by a tour guide to talk us through the hallways and tell us about the many things we saw! The staff at the Old Treasury Building were very friendly. They talked about things to do with the history of the Gold Rush, the way laws were made, the different levels of power and control, the lifestyle of the olden days and we learned how much we have advanced from then in terms of our technology and equipment. Some of us even got to see a replica of the largest gold nugget found during the Gold Rush in Victoria! Some groups were even handed out a miner's license which was used back in that time period for miners to mine for gold.





The entire day ended at around 2:15 pm when we got back on the buses and returned to school. Many of us were feeling tired after our day's journey because we had to walk between the Old Treasury Building and the Immigration Museum which took around 25 minutes. When we arrived back at school, we were glad to spend the rest of the day on the playgrounds so everyone could get together and share our experience with our friends.


